The Town would like residents to be aware that the State has several programs designed to assist eligible households with paying a portion of their winter energy and heating bills. Mass. residents who earn 60% or less of the State median income are eligible for assistance in paying for fuel, electricity and weatherization upgrades. Individuals with income of \$42,411 or less are eligible, while the maximum income level for a family of four is \$81,561, according to the State's Office of Housing and Community Development. Last year, more than 134,000 households received assistance through these programs, although several thousand more were eligible, but did not apply.

Local Housing Authorities

Housing Authority offices are responsible for taking applications and managing public housing units and rental subsidies. Contact individual Housing Authorities to have an application mailed or faxed to you. Section 8 Applications may be submitted once to any participating Housing Authority to be placed on a centralized (state-wide) wait list. You do not need to contact each office. You can also download and print from the MassNAHRO website at www.massnahro.org. Submitted applications must contain an original signature so it must be mailed or delivered to a participating Housing Authority. The Section 8 waitlist is several years long. Public Housing Applications must be submitted to each individual Housing Authority. Each town manages its own public housing, and waitlists vary from town to town. ****IMPORTANT**** Once you are placed on a waitlist, you must notify each Housing Authority, in writing, of any change of address. Waitlist verifications are sent out periodically from each Housing Authority and if no response is received, you will be removed from the waitlist. No exceptions.

Salisbury YOUTH Coalition

Salisbury is committed to supporting young people and families. To do this, the Town has created a community youth development coalition. This coalition is made up of representatives from the schools, police, local businesses, youth serving organizations, local government agencies, healthcare, parents/caregivers and young people. Together, we are using local data to identify the needs of the young people in Salisbury and collaborate together best serve our youth and families.

This work is supported by the Essex County Asset Builder Network, a regional network of six communities (Newburyport, Amesbury, Georgetown, Newbury, Rowley and Salisbury) that is committed to supporting youth and families. The ECAB Network seeks to support young people by building protective factors in youth that help youth thrive and make healthy choices. Research shows the more protective factors young people have, the less likely they are to participate in high-risk behaviors such as substance use, violence or bullying.

This work is funded by a regional grant and will support the new expanded role and provide funds to build the coalition. This funding comes from a state grant from the Department of Public Health, Bureau of Substance Addiction Services, MassCALL3. This grant seeks to prevent the first use of substances by youth, and encourages communities to use a positive youth development approach to prevention. This approach means working with youth and elevating their voice, giving them opportunities to build skills, qualities and relationships that will help them thrive.
